The statistics are grim. Anywhere from 50-70% of young people struggle with or walk away from their faith after high school. This raises a crucial question for parents: What makes the others continue in their faith?

The good news is that parents have the biggest impact on their children's journey of faith. But what practices help young people continue to embrace their faith?

your relationship with Christ, His grace, and His forgiveness. Use life events to make faith real understanding Scripture can impact the world.

Allow kids to wrestle with tough questions. Be guick to listen and challenge kids to think through their issues and doubts, but be slow to give simple answers. Provide resources that can help them understand and grow.

Let kids enjoy the experience of serving others. This will create understanding and empathy

Finally, be what you hope to see in your child. A faith that is alive and exciting will most likely be imitated. Praying, doing devotions, and vocalizing God's work in your life will help kids

see what a normal Christian walk is like.

University of Notre Dame sociologist, Christian **Discuss your own faith journey.** Emphasize Smith, says that parents, for better or worse, are actually the most influential pastors of their children. Every child has free will, and there are as you converse about how knowing God and no magic formulas, but planting and watering the seeds prepare the spiritual soil.



PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Several HCA teachers attended professional development seminars and conferences this summer in an effort to further improve HCA's teaching methods and programs. Four of our lower school teachers took a full week of Orton Gillingham training, a multi-sensory program for teaching phonemic sounds to assist reading and spelling.

Two HCA preschool teachers also attended a one-day phonemic awareness workshop, in accordance with the Winsor Learning Sonday system. This program will enable our preschoolers to better learn their numbers, shapes, colors, and letters with automaticity, providing a stronger ability to read words with fluency.

An HCA fifth grade teacher joined our middle school math teacher for a two-day Eureka math course. This digital math program stresses problem solving strategies and visualization of math concepts that will enable students to have a deeper comprehension of grade-level skills.

AP MUSIC THEORY

HCA's newest Advanced Placement course is AP Music Theory, offered for the first time in the fall of 2018. In this AP course, students explore a variety of music to discover how it works. They learn how musical ideas are developed, and what compositional techniques are universally employed. Students develop the ability to recognize, understand, and describe the processes of tonal music through listening, score study, analysis, and sightsinging. AP Music Theory covers the material typically presented in a college freshman-level Music Theory class. Students receiving a 3, 4, or 5 on the AP exam may receive college credit.
